EXTINGUISHING OF THE FIFTH LENTEN CANDLE IN THE GARDEN

- A: The Garden of Gethsemane. "Come with me to pray," Christ said, and they did: Peter, James, John, Thomas, Andrew, Philip, Bartholomew, Matthew, and James, son of Alphaeus, Simon the Zealot, and Judas, son of James. Only one of the twelve is missing, the other Judas Judas Iscariot.
- C: There, in the growing darkness, beneath gnarled olive trees, Christ knelt and poured out his heart to his father.
- A: "If it is your will Father, please take this cup from me."
- C: And they slept.
- A: "Not my will, but your will, O God."
- C: And they slept.
- A: For the spirit is willing, but the flesh is weak, "My soul aches with sorrow..."
- C: Lord, we are here for you.
- A: Stay with me awhile,"
- C: Lord, you know we will.
- A: "Can you not even stay awake long enough to keep watch with me?"
- C: But Lord...
- A: "Behold, the hour is at hand. Here is my betrayer now." (Pause) Lord, we acknowledge the times we have failed you, just as the disciples did so long ago in the garden. WORD

God speaks to us in scriptures read, sung, and preached.

FIRST READING: Isaiah 43:16-21

The prophet declares that long ago the Lord performed mighty deeds and delivered Israel from Egyptian bondage through the waters of the sea. Now, the Lord is about to do a new thing, bringing the exiles out of Babylon and through the wilderness in a new exodus.

¹⁶Thus says the LORD, who makes a way in the sea, a path in the mighty waters, ¹⁷who brings out chariot and horse, army and warrior; they lie down, they cannot rise, they are extinguished, quenched like a wick: ¹⁸Do not remember the former things, or consider the things of old. ¹⁹I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert. ²⁰The wild animals will honor me, the jackals and the ostriches; for I give water in the wilderness, rivers in the desert, to give drink to my chosen people, ²¹the people whom I formed for myself so that they might declare my praise.

SECOND READING: Philippians 3:4b-14

Writing to Christians in Philippi, Paul admits that his heritage and reputation could give him more reason than most people to place confidence in his spiritual pedigree. But the overwhelming grace of God in Jesus calls Paul to a new set of values.

^{4b}If anyone else has reason to be confident in the flesh, I have more: ⁵circumcised on the eighth day, a member of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew born of Hebrews; as to the law, a Pharisee; ⁶as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to righteousness under the law, blameless.

⁷Yet whatever gains I had, these I have come to regard as loss because of Christ. ⁸More than that, I regard everything as loss because of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things, and I regard them as rubbish, in order that I may gain Christ ⁹ and be found in him, not having a righteousness of my own that comes from the law, but one that comes through faith in Christ, the righteousness from God based on faith. ¹⁰I want to know Christ and the power of his resurrection and the sharing of his sufferings by becoming like him in his death, ¹¹if somehow I may attain the resurrection from the dead.

¹²Not that I have already obtained this or have already reached the goal; but I press on to make it my own, because Christ Jesus has made me his own. ¹³Beloved, I do not consider that I have made it my own but this one thing I do: forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, ¹⁴I press on toward the goal for the prize of the heavenly call of God in Christ Jesus.

The house was filled with the fragrance of the perfume. ⁴But Judas Iscariot, one of his disciples (the one who was about to betray him), said, 5Why was this perfume not sold for three hundred denarii and the money given to the poor? ⁶(He said this not because he cared about the poor, but because he was a thief; he kept the common purse and used to steal what was put into it.) ⁷Jesus said, "Leave her alone. She bought it so that she might keep it for the day of my burial. ⁸You always have the poor with you, but you do not always have me."



During Advent, as we approach Christmas, we light a candle each Sunday in expectation of the birth of Jesus, "the light of the world." In our **LENTEN WREATH**, we will put out a candle each week as we draw near Good Friday, the day of Jesus' death upon the cross, when the light of the world was temporarily extinguished and darkness covered our world. Join in the responses that are spoken each week as we prepare ourselves for the most important events in all history.

WOODEN CANDLE SLEEVES for the altar which illustrate Jesus' dark journey to the cross were created by *Michael Schmidt*. The images, which are burnt into the wood, start with the last supper (body and blood) followed by Jesus praying in the garden of Gethsemane, his arrest by the Roman guard, the cock crowing three times at Peter's denial of knowing Jesus, the path to Golgotha, the crown of thorns and the nails of doom, Christ on the cross (. . . "it is finished") and ends with the removal of Christ from the cross for burial. Hopefully these images will burn themselves into our hearts and minds and remind us of the true reason for the Easter season; John 3:16.

Wholehearted Love

The one magnificent thing Mary could wholeheartedly do for Jesus was to love him. Most stunning in the memory of that dinner in Bethany, the line lingering after all the details fade, is this gorgeous passage: "The house was filled with the fragrance of the perfume" (John 12:3). Such beauty! What Mary gave in those astonishing moments was what she had discovered at Jesus' feet.

For Mary had been at his feet before; she sat there at another time in that house, indifferent to aromas of cooking and cleaning, but rather listening, attending to his word. We can easily imagine what she heard from Jesus, words other disciples and the merely curious alike heard: stories of mercy and hope, parables of thieves, tales of servants and masters, the directions of love. And at still another time she knelt at Jesus' feet, weeping beside a stone gateway to death, stench rising from her dead brother's body. Daring to have faith in the one who called, Mary ran to Jesus and, out of the wrinkles of scolding despair, heard him: "Lazarus, come out!"

The sweet, extravagant odor of love was in every room as Mary anointed Jesus' feet, the scent ascending the way psalmists' prayers rose as incense before God.

Such love has no choice: it spends itself without caution, is not reduced to affordable charity, deliberately disregards prudence. It strains limits of convention and introduces itself with utter humility. It kneels.

Such love is not easily accepted: At home Martha was indignant at Mary. At the tomb, onlookers' irritation ripened into execution schemes. At a Bethany dinner, Judas had little tolerance for wasteful devotion to a failed and foolhardy cause or its disappointing savior.

Following Mary's example, we are called to kneel at the feet of Jesus, at the feet of one another. Jesus, too, assumes the posture of Mary at the feet of the disciples, welcoming them—and us—into the way of wholehearted love. May the house be filled with its fragrance.
