

WORD

God speaks to us in scriptures read, sung, and preached.

FIRST READING: Acts 5:27-32

Peter has been arrested for proclaiming the good news of Jesus' death and resurrection. His response to the charges of the high priest summarizes the early church's proclamation of forgiveness of sin through repentance.

²⁷When they had brought [the apostles], they had them stand before the council. The high priest questioned them, ²⁸saying, "We gave you strict orders not to teach in this name, yet here you have filled Jerusalem with your teaching and you are determined to bring this man's blood on us." ²⁹But Peter and the apostles answered, "We must obey God rather than any human authority. ³⁰The God of our ancestors raised up Jesus, whom you had killed by hanging him on a tree. ³¹God exalted him at his right hand as Leader and Savior that he might give repentance to Israel and forgiveness of sins. ³²And we are witnesses to these things, and so is the Holy Spirit whom God has given to those who obey him."

L: This is the Word of the Lord.

C: Thanks be to God.

SECOND READING: Revelation 1:4-8

The book of Revelation recounts a mystical vision of the risen Christ, experienced by a Christian prophet named John. Here he describes Christ as a timeless redeemer, the beginning, present, and end of all time.

⁴John to the seven churches that are in Asia:

Grace to you and peace from him who is and who was and who is to come, and from the seven spirits who are before his throne, ⁵ and from Jesus Christ, the faithful witness, the firstborn of the dead, and the ruler of the kings of the earth.

To him who loves us and freed us from our sins by his blood, ⁶and made us to be a kingdom, priests serving his God and Father, to him be glory and dominion forever and ever. Amen.

⁷Look! He is coming with the clouds; every eye will see him, even those who pierced him; and on his account all the tribes of the earth will wail. So it is to be. Amen.

⁸I am the Alpha and the Omega, says the Lord God, who is and who was and who is to come, the Almighty.

L: This is the Word of the Lord. C: Thanks be to God.

P: The Holy Gospel according to Saint John the 20th chapter. C: Glory to you, O Lord.

GOSPEL: John 20:19-31

The risen Jesus appears to his disciples, offering them a benediction, a commission, and the gift of the Holy Spirit. But one of their number is missing, and his unbelief prompts another visit from the Lord.

¹⁹When it was evening on that day, the first day of the week, and the doors of the house where the disciples had met were locked for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." ²⁰After he said this, he showed them his hands and his side. Then the disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. ²¹Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." ²²When he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. ²³If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained." ²⁴But Thomas (who was called the Twin), one of the twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. ²⁵So the other disciples told him, "We have seen the Lord." But he said to them, "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands, and put my finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in his side, I will not believe."

²⁶A week later his disciples were again in the house, and Thomas was with them. Although the doors were shut, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." ²⁷Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it in my side. Do not doubt but believe." ²⁸Thomas answered him, "My Lord and my God!" ²⁹Jesus said to him, "Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe." ³⁰Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of his disciples, which are not written in this book. ³¹But these are written so that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through believing you may have life in his name.





AUTHOR'S NOTE

We remember the disciple Thomas because of how today's reading from the Gospel of St. John relates his reaction to the Resurrection, but all four of the Gospels tell that Jesus' followers felt doubt after hearing the news of his rising. They had lived with the promise of a New Kingdom – clearly a promise they didn't fully understand – and were shattered by the Crucifixion. Then, still reeling from that blow, along came a weird, incomprehensible twist that must have sounded like a delusion if you weren't there like the women at the tomb.

Something like the first part of Thomas' story happens every day, somewhere, on a scale that feels cosmic to the person living it, doesn't it? You choose a career path in college that blows up later or at least feels not-so-predestined as it once did. You're married and then you're not. A parent anchors your life and then is lost to you. Or, like Isaac in this play, you're a young adult who's plotted out a life only to see it go off track quickly.

Then, someone tells you about the Resurrection. Maybe it's a reminder that brings something you learned long ago to the front of your brain. Maybe it's an idea that you've ignored or pushed away but can't any more. Maybe you hear about it and God's grace for the first time.

What happens then? You wrestle with it, just like Thomas did.

And God's grace keeps flowing, through other people and over you. You receive grace and you show it to others and receive it again. You grasp the promise, as Thomas does.
