UPDATES FOR COVID PROTOCOLS

Due to the increased health of our community and in continued awareness of CDC and county health guidelines for safe gatherings, our congregation has implemented the following practices effective February 24, 2022.

NEWLY ADJUSTED PRACTICES

- Congregational singing resumed.
- Social Distancing in the pews has been removed.
- Communion has returned to pre-Covid practices of inviting members to come forward to receive the holy wafer and cup of wine.
- There will no longer be a staggered dismissal.

CURRENT PRACTICES THAT WILL REMAIN until continued improvement in community health:

- Masks are still required (especially since we are no longer social distancing and are now singing again).
- Sharing the peace will still be done from the pews.
- The offering plate will remain at the back of the sanctuary at the bulletin table.

Our current objective is to witness two weeks of increased community health in the 'yellow' or 'moderate' rank. - A: We come to worship God as the Lenten season begins, aware of our frailty and our failings.
- C: We come seeking God's mercy, acknowledging our mortality.
- A: Having received the water of baptism,
- **C:** we come to be marked now with ashes.
- A: May we humble ourselves before God, not with a yoke of burden,
- C: but with a mantle of freedom in Jesus' name.

¹Have mercy on me, O God, according to your loving kindness; in your great compassion blot out my offenses.

- P: Restore us, O God, and let your anger depart from us.
- C: Hear us, O God, for your mercy is great.
- P: Friends, God is for us, not against us. For that very reason, God sent his Son into the world not to condemn the world, but that the world might be saved through him. Believe the good news in Jesus Christ, we are forgiven in the name of the Father, and of the † Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Now return to the Lord with joy and gladness. Sing a song of redemption. THE IMPOSITION OF ASHES

- P: We bow our heads before you, O God, aware of our sinfulness and our shortcomings. Remembering our baptism, the watermark of the cross upon us, we also receive this ashen cross upon our foreheads--another sign that in life and in death, we belong to you. In the name of Jesus Christ, crucified, risen, and coming again, we pray.

FIRST READING: Joel 2:1-2, 12-17

Because of the coming Day of the Lord, the prophet Joel calls the people to a community lament. The repentant community reminds God of his gracious character and asks God to spare the people, lest the nations doubt God's power to save.

¹Blow the trumpet in Zion; sound the alarm on my holy mountain! Let all the inhabitants of the land tremble, for the day of the LORD is coming, it is near -2^{a} day of darkness and gloom, a day of clouds and thick darkness! Like blackness spread upon the mountains a great and powerful army comes; their like has never been from of old, nor will be again after them in ages to come.

¹²Yet even now, says the LORD, return to me with all your heart, with fasting, with weeping, and with mourning; ¹³rend your hearts and not your clothing. Return to the LORD, your God, for he is gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love, and relents from punishing. ¹⁴Who knows whether he will not turn and relent, and leave a blessing behind him, a grain offering and a drink offering for the LORD, your God? ¹⁵Blow the trumpet in Zion; sanctify a fast; call a solemn assembly; ¹⁶gather the people. Sanctify the congregation; assemble the aged; gather the children, even infants at the breast. Let the bridegroom leave his room, and the bride her canopy. ¹⁷Between the vestibule and the altar let the priests, the ministers of the LORD, weep. Let them say, "Spare your people, O LORD, and do not make your heritage a mockery, a byword among the nations. Why should it be said among the peoples, 'Where is their God?'"

SECOND READING: 2 Corinthians 5:20b-6:10

Out of love for humankind, the Sinless One experienced sin and suffering so that the redemptive power of God could penetrate the darkest, most forbidding, and tragic depths of human experience. No aspect of human life is ignored by the presence of God's grace. Because of this, Paul announces that this day is a day of God's grace, an acceptable time to turn toward God's mercy.

^{20b}We entreat you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God. ²¹For our sake he made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God.

^{6:1}As we work together with him, we urge you also not to accept the grace of God in vain. ²For he says,

"At an acceptable time I have listened to you, and on a day of salvation I have helped you."

See, now is the acceptable time; see, now is the day of salvation!

³We are putting no obstacle in anyone's way, so that no fault may be found with our ministry, ⁴but as servants of God we have commended ourselves in every way: through great endurance, in afflictions, hardships, calamities, ⁵beatings, imprisonments, riots, labors, sleepless nights, hunger; ⁶by purity, knowledge, patience, kindness, holiness of spirit, genuine love, ⁷truthful speech, and the power of God; with the weapons of righteousness for the right hand and for the left; ⁸in honor and dishonor, in ill repute and good repute. We are treated as impostors, and yet are true; ⁹as unknown, and yet are well known; as dying, and see -- we are alive; as punished, and yet not killed; ¹⁰as sorrowful, yet always rejoicing; as poor, yet making many rich; as having nothing, and yet possessing everything.

In the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus commends almsgiving, prayer, and fasting, but emphasizes that spiritual devotion must not be done for show.

[Jesus said to the disciples:] "Beware of practicing your piety before others in order to be seen by them; for then you have no reward from your Father in heaven.

²"So whenever you give alms, do not sound a trumpet before you, as the hypocrites do in the synagogues and in the streets, so that they may be praised by others. Truly I tell you, they have received their reward. ³But when you give alms, do not let your left hand know what your right hand is doing, ⁴so that your alms may be done in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you.

⁵"And whenever you pray, do not be like the hypocrites; for they love to stand and pray in the synagogues and at the street corners, so that they may be seen by others. Truly I tell you, they have received their reward. ⁶But whenever you pray, go into your room and shut the door and pray to your Father who is in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you.

Truly I tell you, they have received their reward. ¹⁷But when you fast, put oil on your head and wash your face, ¹⁸so that your fasting may be seen not by others but by your Father who is in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you.

¹⁹"Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust consume and where thieves break in and steal; ²⁰but store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust consumes and where thieves do not break in and steal. ²¹For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also."





LENT 2022 - JOURNEY WITH JESUS MID-WEEK LENTEN SERVICE ON THURSDAYS BEGINNING MARCH 10th AT 7:00 PM



This year, in our mid-week services, we will be exploring the lives of some of those who were close to Jesus during his last week of life. These services will take place **Thursdays beginning March 10th at 7:00 p.m. both in person and online**. We will step into the lives of people like Mary Magdalene, Peter, even Judas. Who are these people and how did they impact the story of Christ?

Freedom Dust

Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return" (*ELW*, p. 254). Today is a day for remembering: We remember our mortality. We remember that we are simply creatures, not the Creator. We remember those we love who have been returned to the dust. We remember our place in the large arc of history. We remember that we are frail and small and that the world does not revolve around us. It's a solemn day to remember. But that remembering also leads us to freedom.

When we remember that we are not God, we are freed to stop pretending we are. When we remember that we do not have complete control of our lives, we are freed to hold things loosely. When we remember the insignificance of our wealth, our possessions, and our status, we are freed to practice radical generosity. When we, along with the rest of humanity, remember the weight of our mistakes and our shortcomings, we are freed from the need to prove how good and worthy we are. When we remember that all of us are dust together, we are freed from the incessant cycle of ladder climbing and reputation protecting. When we remember that our own lives are short, we are freed to see the miracle of God's life-giving power.

Freedom comes to God's people in the most unlikely of places: in the desert, in the wilderness, in exile, under an oppressive empire, on the cross, in the homes of scared disciples locked away. Freedom arrives in the ordinary things of water, word, bread, and wine. And today, freedom comes to us in ashes, amid fragile and imperfect people.

So, remember that you are dust. But be freed, trusting that as in the very beginning, from just a speck of dust God can create new and abundant life.
